Gold to Boron Aryl Transfer From a T-Shape Phosphine-Borane Gold(I) Complex

ABSTRACT: T-Shape gold(I) complexes with significant $Au \rightarrow B$ interactions were prepared from the phosphine-borane $iPr_2P(o-C_6H_4)BFXyl_2$ [Fxyl = 3,5-(F₃C)₂C₆H₃]. The (P,B)AuAr^F complex **4** [Ar^F = 4-(F₃C)C₆H₄] was

obtained by an indirect route involving ligand exchange from $(ArO)_3PAuAr^F$ **3a** $[Ar = 2,4-(t-Bu)_2C_6H_3]$. A different outcome was observed with the analogous precursor $(MeO)_3PAuAr^F$ **3b**. Here, the phosphite remains bonded to gold and the borane moiety abstracts the Ar^F group from gold to give the zwitterionic dicoordinate gold(I) complex **5**. DFT calculations support a 2-step associative pathway for this gold to boron aryl transfer. It involves a square-planar gold(I) com-



plex with enhanced Au→B interaction as key intermediate, it proceeds *via* a 3-center transition.

Phosphine-boranes (P,B) and related ambiphilic ligands open interesting avenues in gold chemistry. The formation of $Au \rightarrow LA$ (LA = Lewis Acid) interactions has been thoroughly studied in the frame of σ -acceptor Z-type ligands¹ and the resulting electron-deprived complexes have been applied in π -activation-based gold catalysis.² $Au \rightarrow LA$ interactions supported by two or three donor buttresses are now quite common and actually known with various Lewis acid moieties based on B, Ga, In, Sn, Sb, Te...³,4 Comparatively, T-shape gold(I) complexes deriving from bidentate ambiphilic ligands are much rarer (Figure 1). We reported in 2006 the first such complex A.⁵ The highly Lewis acidic borafluorenyl moiety imparts significant $Au \rightarrow B$ interaction, but the corresponding phosphine-borane i-Pr₂P(o-C₆H₄)BFlu is stable only at very low temperature. In collaboration with the group of W. Uhl, we then prepared complexes B from the geminal phosphine-alane Mes_2PC (=CHPh)Alt-Bu₂.⁶ Here, the presence of an organic group at Au (R = Me, C_6F_5 , $C \equiv CPh$) is needed to observe $Au \rightarrow Al$ interaction. In the case of chloride, the high Al/Cl affinity favors internal ionization and zwitterionic complexes are obtained.⁵ In addition, Erker et al studied in 2019 gold(I) complexes C deriving from vicinal phosphine-boranes.⁶ Of note, the strength of the $Au \rightarrow B$ interaction was found to markedly depend on the position of the SiMe₃ substituent on the ligand backbone.

We recently introduced the phosphine-borane (P,B) **1** featuring a highly Lewis acidic and moderately hindered boron center.⁹ It proved an efficient and general catalyst for the dehydrogenation of amine-boranes under metal-free conditions.¹⁰ Its ability to engage in strong $M \rightarrow B$ interactions was also substantiated and exploited to stabilize low-valent half sandwich Rh complexes,¹¹ while an original 1,1-phosphaboration process was observed with gold(I) alkynyl and vinyl complexes.¹²

In this work, the preparation of T-shape gold(I) complexes was investigated from $\mathbf{1}$. The BFxyl₂ moiety was found to engage in strong Au \rightarrow B interactions, but to remain reactive, as substantiated by internal abstraction of the aryl group from gold. The mechanism of this gold to boron aryl transfer has been investigated computationally.

Access to the targeted (P,B)AuAr complex was first attempted by coordination of the phosphine-borane to gold(I) chloride followed by transmetallation (Scheme 1). Treatment of 1 with (tht)AuCl (tht = tetrahydrothiophene) cleanly and rapidly afforded the corresponding (P,B)AuCl complex 2 which was isolated in 84% yield as a white solid (mp 103.7 °C). Crystals suitable for X-ray diffraction analysis were obtained by slow diffusion of pentane into a saturated dichloromethane solution of 2 at -20°C.¹³ Accordingly, the phosphine-borane ligand chelates the metal. As a result, gold is 3-coordinate and sits in T-shape geometry with P-Au-Cl and P-Au-B bond angles of 174.25(2) and 81.25(5)°, respectively. Rare precedents for T-shape Au(I) complexes derive from ambiphilic (Figure 1)5,6,8 or pincer LXL ligands.14 The Au-B distance in 2 is short at 2.555(2) Å. It is significantly shorter than that observed in the related complex A featuring a borafluorenyl moiety (2.663(8) Å)⁵ and actually exceeds the sum of the covalent radii¹⁵ by only 16%. The highly Lewis acidic BFxyl₂ moiety thus engages in relatively strong Au→B interaction, which is favored over chloride abstraction, in contrast to what was observed with the geminal (P,Al) ligand. Substitution of the chloride at gold for an aryl group was then attempted but disappointingly, no suitable conditions could be found to obtain (P,B)AuAr complexes by transmetallation from 2. We thus turned to an indirect route involving a gold(I) aryl precursor with a labile ligand that could be displaced by the phosphine-borane 1. As for the gold(I) vinyl species we previously studied, 12 the sterically demanding triaryl phosphite $P(OAr)_3$ (Ar = 2,4-(t-Bu)₂C₆H₃) showed a suitable balance between the stability of the organogold precursor and the ligand exchange with the phosphine-borane. Hence, 1 was found to react slowly and cleanly with 3a [prepared from (ArO)₃PAuCl and $Ar^{F}ZnCl$, $Ar^{F} = 4-(F_{3}C)C_{6}H_{4}$ in dichloromethane at room temperature. ³¹P NMR monitoring shows the release of free phosphite (ArO)₃P (δ 130 ppm) and concomitant formation of the (P,B)AuAr^F complex **4** (δ 71.4 ppm). The ¹⁹F NMR spectrum displays two different CF₃ signals at δ -63.1 and -62.8 ppm (integrating in 4:1 ratio) for the Fxyl and Ar^F groups, respectively. Multiple precipitations in acetonitrile at -20°C enabled to remove the phosphite side-product and isolate complex **4** (69 % yield). Crystals were grown from a pentane solution at -20°C. The X-ray diffraction study revealed a T-shape structure similar to that of **2**, with P-Au-C and P-Au-B bond angles of 176.8(3) and 79.2(3)° in **4**. The Au-B distance (2.72(1) Å, r = 1.24) is slightly higher than in the chloro complex **2** (2.555(2) Å) but remains well within the sum of van der Waals radii (3.90 Å). ¹⁶

The reaction of **1** with **3a** thus provides access to the targeted (P,B)AuAr complex **4**, but the removal of the $(ArO)_3P$ phosphite is laborious. With the aim to facilitate the work-up and improve the efficiency of the preparation, we envisioned to use a more easily removable phosphite such as $(MeO)_3P$ (bp = $110^{\circ}C$). The corresponding aryl gold precursor $(MeO)_3PAu(4-(CF_3)C_6H_4)$ **3b** was prepared from $(MeO)_3PAuCl$ and Ar^FZnCl and reacted with the phosphine-borane **1** in THF at room temperature (Scheme 2). ³¹P NMR spectroscopy showed the disappearance of the signals for **1** and **3b** to give two doublets at δ 142.6 et 54.0 ppm with a large J_{PP} coupling constant of 425.6 Hz. This is indicative of the presence and *trans* coordination of the two phosphines at gold. Concomitantly, a sharp signal appears at δ –6.3 ppm in the ¹¹B NMR spectrum, signaling the presence of a tetracoordinate boron center. After work-up, the resulting complex **5** was isolated in 82% yield as a white solid. The crystals obtained by addition of diethyl ether to a pentane solution of **5** at –20°C were analysed by X-ray diffraction. The gold center is dicoordinate and its geometry slightly deviates from linearity with a P1–Au–P2 bond angle of 167.8(1)°. The Ar^F group has been transferred from gold to boron, which is

tetracoordinate. The shortest C···Au distances with the aryl groups at boron amount to 2.962 and 3.011 Å (with the C_{ipso} and one C_{ortho} atoms of Ar^F), indicating the existence of only weak, if any, arene-gold interaction.¹⁷ The more electron-donating and less sterically demanding phosphite $P(OMe)_3$ thus remains bonded to gold, in contrast to $(ArO)_3P^{18}$ The formation of **5** from **1** and **3b** can be understood as the insertion of the phosphine-borane into the $Au-Ar^F$ bond. A two-step associative process is more likely, with coordination of **1** to gold, followed by the transfer of the Ar^F group from gold to boron (instead of phosphite release, as observed for the formation of complex **4**). This mechanistic scenario is supported by the reaction of $P(OMe)_3$ with the P(B)AuArF complex **4**, which also led to the zwitterionic complex **5**.

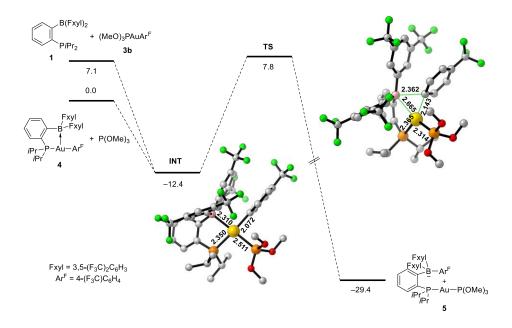


Figure 2. Energy profiles computed for the migration of the Ar^F group from Au to B in the reactions 1 + 3b and 4 + P(OMe)₃ at the B3PW91-D3(BJ)/SDD+f(Au),6-31G** (other atoms) level of theory. ΔG values in kcal/mol, bond lengths in Å.

Abstractions of an organic fragment from a transition metal by the Lewis acid moiety of an ambiphilic ligand, as observed upon formation of the zwitterionic complex $\bf 5$, are rare, 12,19 and very little is known about the mechanism of such processes. This prompted us to investigate the formation of $\bf 5$ computationally. Calculations were performed at the B3PW91-D3(BJ)/SDD+f(Au),6-31G** (other atoms) level of theory on the actual species. The two synthetic routes leading to $\bf 5$ experimentally, $ie \, \bf 4 + P(OMe)_3$ and $\bf 1 + 3b$, were considered. In both cases, the formation of the zwitterionic complex was predicted to result from an associative, 2-step pathway. The 4-coordinate gold(I) complex INT (with the phosphine-borane, the phosphite P(OMe)_3 and the ArF group bonded to Au) is found as key common intermediate (Figure 2). No transition state could

be located for an alternative pathway involving direct insertion of the phosphine-borane 1 into the Au-Ar^F bond of the (MeO)₃PAuAr^F precursor **3b**. The formation of the zwitterionic complex **5** is very exergonic (ΔG \leq -30 kcal/mol), slightly more from **1** + **3b** due to the higher stability of **4** + P(OMe)₃ (by about 7 kcal/mol). The absence of significant arene-gold interaction in 5 is supported by NBO analysis, where only weak donoracceptor interactions are found at the second-order perturbation level (ΔE_{NBO} < 5 kcal/mol for $\pi_{C=C} \to \sigma^*_{AuP(OMe)3}$ and < 1 kcal/mol for $d_{z2(Au)} \to \pi^*_{C=C}$). The structure and bonding situation of **INT** deserve comments. The borane moiety acts as a σ -acceptor ligand. The ensuing Au \rightarrow B interaction is stronger than in the 3-coordinate (P,B)AuAr^F complex **4**. This is apparent from the Au···B distance which is substantially shortened (from 2.584 Å in 4 to 2.310 Å in INT), while the environment around boron is more pyramidalized (Σ (CBC) from 356.1° in **4** to 344.0° in **INT**) and further corroborated by NBO analyses (Δ E_{NBO}: 25.4 kcal/mol for **4** and 53.4 kcal/mol for **INT**). Of note, the geometry at Au is close to square-planar ($\tau_{\delta} = 0.16$), 20 with P-Au-P, i-Pr₂P-Au-B and B-Au-P(OMe)₃ bond angles of 98.06°, 82.09° and 170.34°, respectively. This is a peculiar feature of tetra-coordinate Au(I) complexes featuring Z-type ligands, so far authenticated (and thoroughly studied) with tridentate diphosphine-boranes and related ambiphilic ligands.^{3a,g,4a,e,f,h-j} The transition state **TS** with 3-center Au/B/C_{ipso}(Ar^F) interaction connects **INT** to the zwitterionic complex **5**. The Au \rightarrow B interaction vanishes and simultaneously the Ar^F group shifts from gold to boron. While 2-electron redox transformations at gold (oxidative addition/reductive elimination) have recently garnered huge interest,21 the B-aryl coupling from **INT** to **5** proceeds at gold(I) (without change in the oxidation state of gold) and stands as a non-reductive elimination.²²

The activation barrier computed for the conversion of **INT** into **5** (ca 20 kcal/mol) is consistent with the experimental observations (few hours of reaction at room temperature). In **TS**, the Ar^F group bridges gold and boron (the C_{ipso}–Au and C_{ipso}–B bonds deviate from the Ar^F plane by 26° and 47°, respectively). The Au–Ar^F breaking bond (2.143 Å) is slightly elongated (by ca 3.4 %) with respect to the square-planar complex **INT** while the B–Ar^F forming bond (2.362 Å) is elongated by > 40% with respect to the zwitterionic product **5**, indicating a relatively early transition state. The Ar^F transfer from gold to boron induces significant elongation of the Au···B distance (from 2.310 Å in **INT**, to 2.665 Å in **TS**) and noticeable widening of the P–Au–P skeleton (from 98.06° in **INT** to 119.29° in **TS**).

Intrinsic Bond Orbital calculations (IBOs)²³ have recently emerged as a powerful mean to analyse reaction mechanisms and associated electron flows.²⁴ Here, the IBOs of **INT**, **TS** and **5** were inspected to gain more insight into the intricacies of the aryl migration from gold to boron (Figure 3).²⁵ Accordingly, the metal was found to disengage from $Au \rightarrow B$ interaction. The associated IBO is more strongly localized on gold in **TS** (91.6 %) than in **INT** (81.4 %). The B contribution to the Au-B orbital decreases significantly from **INT** (13.1 %) to **TS** (2.9 %). In the meantime, the $Au-Ar^F$ bond evolves to a 3-center $Au/B/C_{ipso}(Ar^F)$ interaction. The corresponding IBO is centered on $C_{ipso}(Ar^F)$ (64-65 %). The contribution of gold decreases from 23.2 % in **INT** to 12.4 % in **TS**, while that of boron increases from 6.7 % in **INT** to 14.8 % in **TS**.

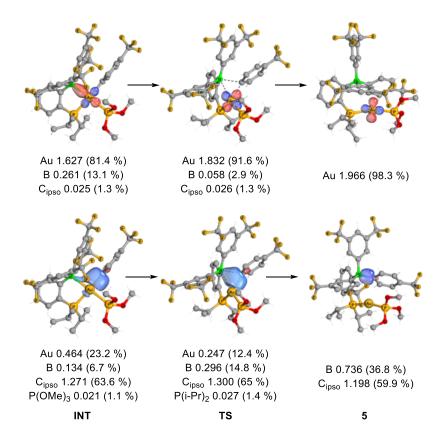


Figure 3. Intrinsic Bond Orbital (IBOs) of the intermediate square-planar gold(I) complex INT, 3-centered transition state TS associated to the migration of the Ar^F group from Au to B and zwitterionic product 5. Numbers relate the fraction of electrons of the doubly occupied IBO assigned to each atom. Percentages into brackets correspond to participation of the main atoms in the associated IBO.

In conclusion, the phosphine-borane $\mathbf{1}$ was found to readily chelate gold(I) and form T-Shape complexes. The borane moiety is engaged in significant $Au \rightarrow B$ interaction, but it remains active and may act as an internal acceptor, as substantiated by the formation of the zwitterionic complex $\mathbf{5}$ upon gold to boron aryl transfer. From a mechanistic viewpoint, the formation of $\mathbf{5}$ involves a square-planar gold(I) complex with enhanced $Au \rightarrow B$ interaction as key intermediate. The B-aryl coupling proceeds via a 3-center transition state. The metal disengages from the $Au \rightarrow B$ interaction while the Ar^F group shifts from gold to boron. The gold to boron aryl transfer leading to $\mathbf{5}$ stands as a rare example of redox neutral elimination, and it is actually the first occurring at gold(I). Future work will seek to explore the generality of such a process, varying the ambiphilic ligand, the metal and the co-ligand. On long-term, it is our aim to study how ambiphilic ligands influence the reactivity of transition metals, to identify new paths assisted by the Lewis acid moiety, and to exploit them in catalytic transformations of synthetic interest.
