Identify the outlook for the hotel industry in a declining and crisis situation

Decline since the early 2000's

- Decrease in attractiveness
- Loss of brand image
- Drop in the number of visitors

Covid-19 crisis

- Shutdown of 90% of Lourdes economy
- Mass tourism, with a single and highly segmented market

Transformation of tourism

- Behavioral changes
- Digitalization of tourism
- Commitment towards a more sustainable tourism

Lourdes, 2nd hotel city in France

- Difficulties for the hotel industry, which seems to have reached a turning point in its development

Does the hotel industry engage in a strategy of innovation?

METHODOLOGY

Qualitative approach motivated by the objective of an in-depth analysis of a phenomenon using a mixed "inductivo-hypothetico-deductive" approach

Prior to the research

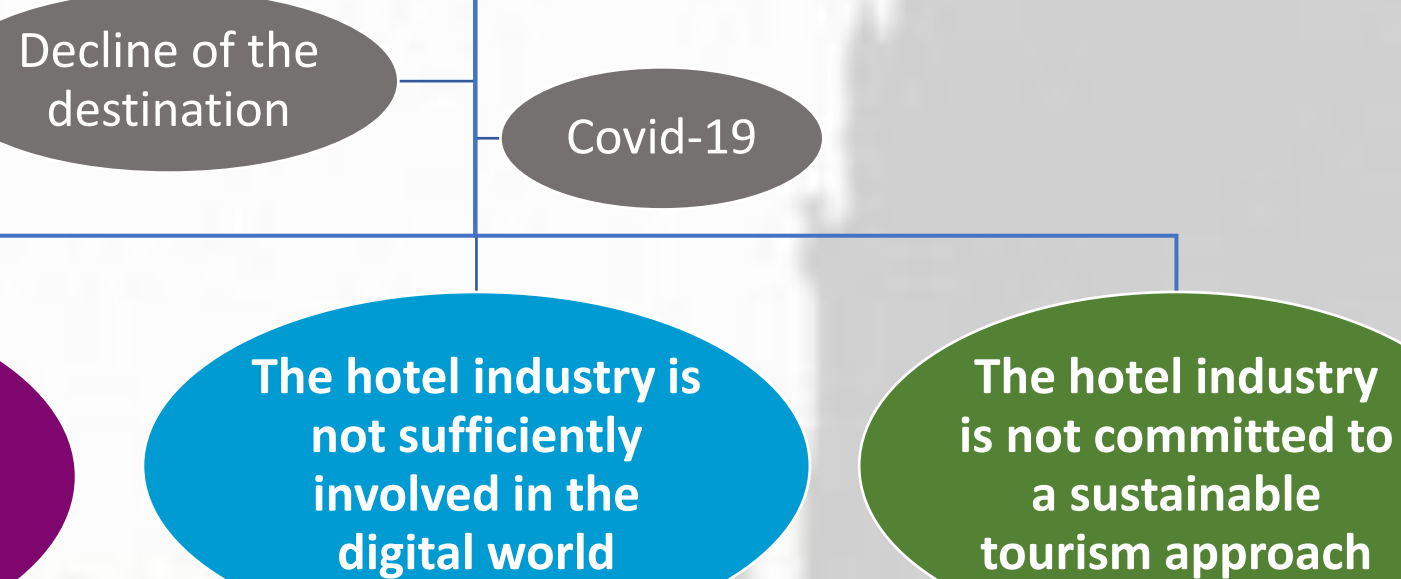
- Positionality of the practitioner-researcher
- Extensive literature review

Exploratory phase

- 118 hotel visits
- 111 exploratory interviews
- Direct and indirect observation
- Archival and statistical research

- In-depth knowledge of the territory
- Development of a qualified database on the hotel industry of Lourdes
- Design of 3 hypothesis for the research

Does the hotel industry of Lourdes engage in a strategy of innovation?



Research design

- Identification of key indicators
- Development of a semi-structured interview guide
- Thorough sampling using the Ascending Hierarchical Classification method based on 12 preset parameters

A 28-interview qualitative study

- Comprehensive manually made transcription
- 2 encoding methods: predictive and inductive
- Several levels of analysis: lexicometric, structural, semantic and mixed

Further research

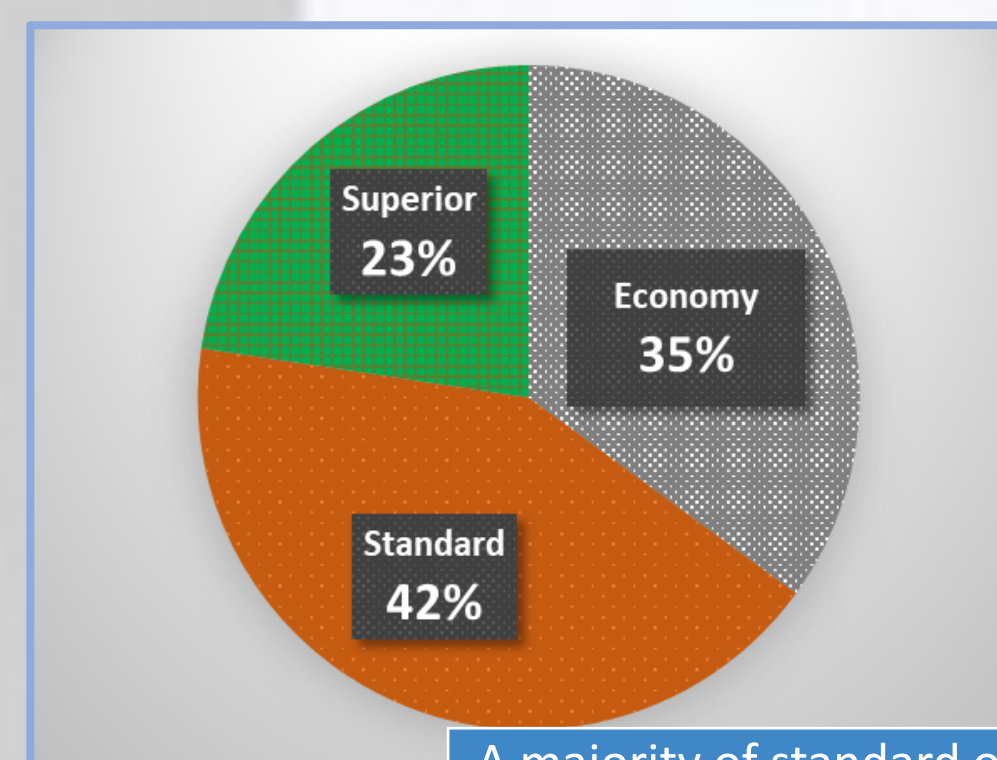
- Validation through triangulation technique
- Deepening through additional interviews: other kinds of accommodation + hotels in other cities + pilgrimage directors



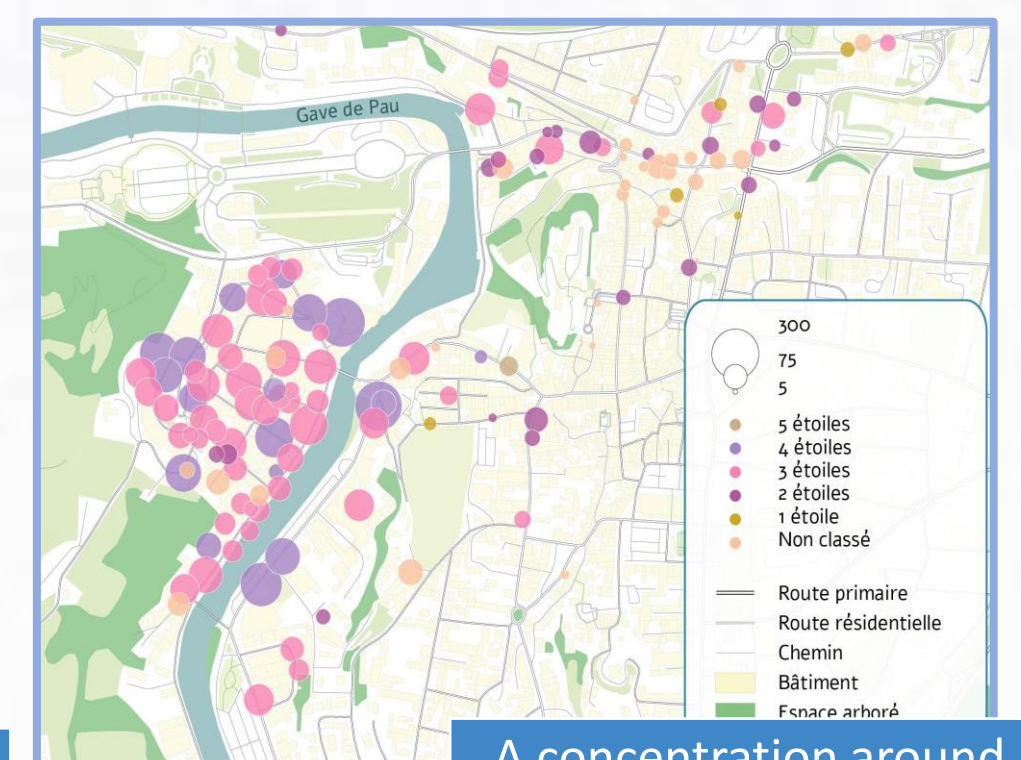
Analysis carried out through dedicated softwares: Sphinx iQ2 & MAXQDA



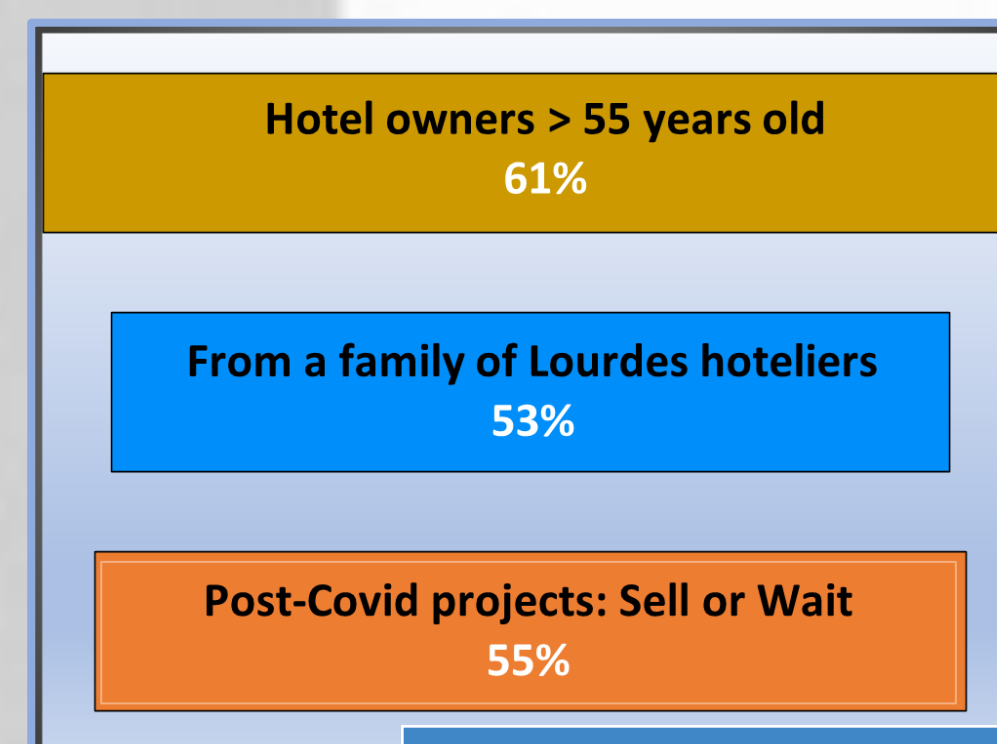
EXPLORATORY STAGE FINDINGS



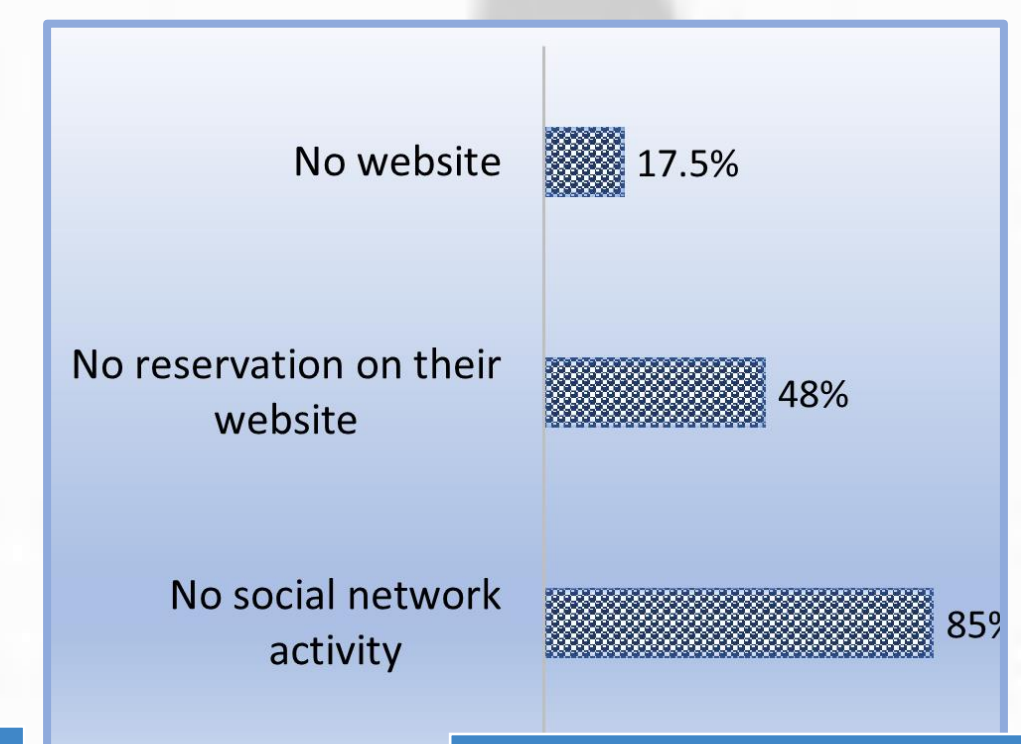
A majority of standard or economy hotels



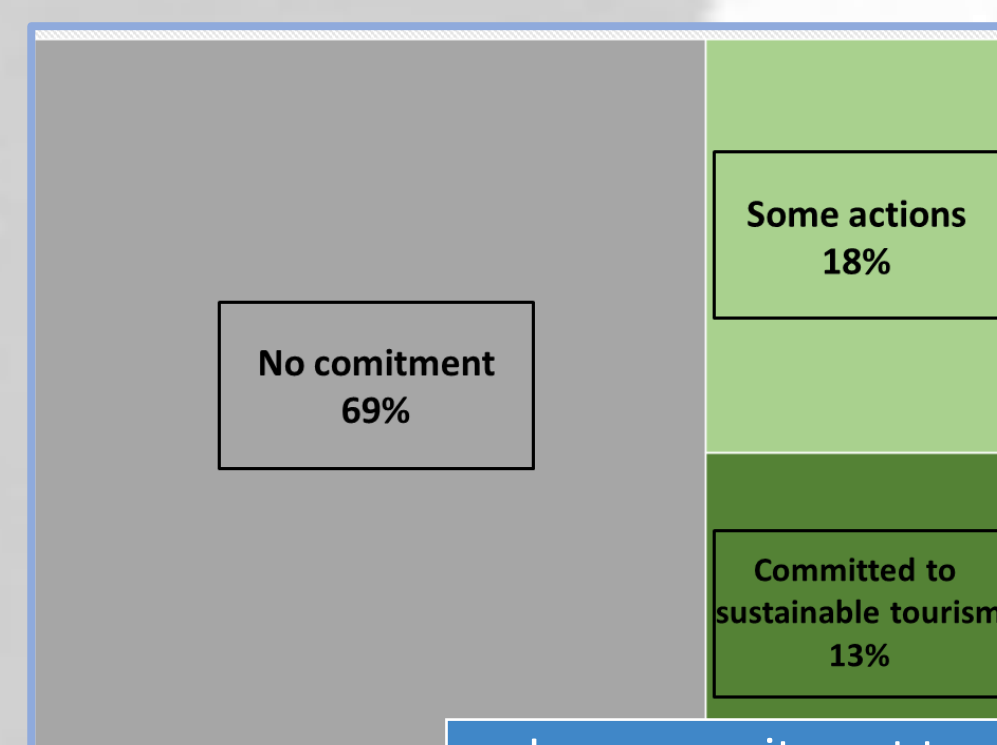
A concentration around the Sanctuary
