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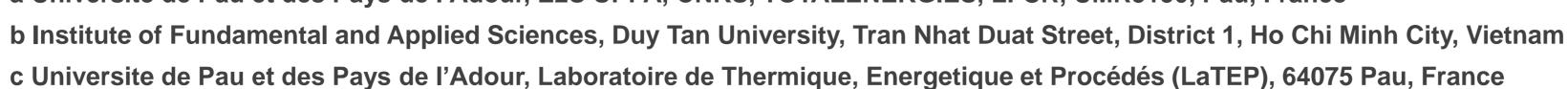
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# Dissolution of H<sub>2</sub>-rich gas mixtures in brine under subsurface storage conditions: molecular simulations and thermodynamic modeling

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## **Context & Motivations**

The storage of hydrogen in deep saline aquifers through Power-to-Gas process offer a great capacity and geographical availability for large-scale renewable energy storage. However, the contact between gas, brine, and rock can affect the mobility and stability of hydrogen and is not sufficiently documented at the time being. Thus, the accurate knowledge of thermophysical properties is required for the study and development of such infrastructure.

In this work, the first part focuses on the use of Monte Carlo simulations to predict H<sub>2</sub>/brine solubility which is then validated against experimental data measured in this work. In the second part, literature data (CH<sub>4</sub>/NaCl brine, CO<sub>2</sub>/NaCl brine) and measured data (experiments + molecular simulations) are used to optimize thermodynamic models. It is shown that the developed thermodynamic model can be used to predict the vaporliquid equilibria of H<sub>2</sub>/NaCl brine and H<sub>2</sub>/CH<sub>4</sub>/CO<sub>2</sub>/NaCl brine systems for underground H<sub>2</sub> storage and bio-methanation applications.

Mixing rules: Lorentz-Berthelot (LB)

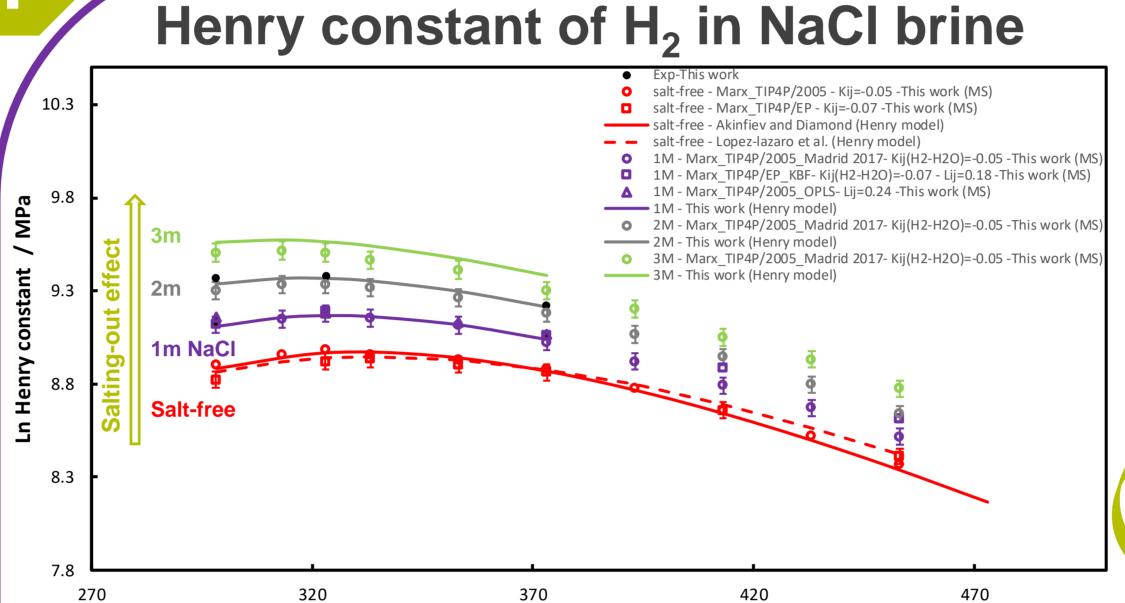

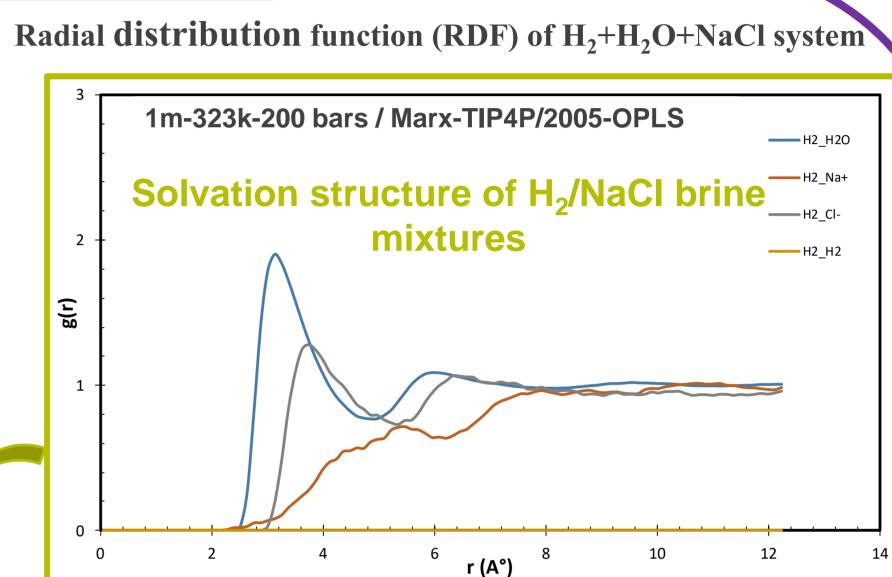

#### Simulation results



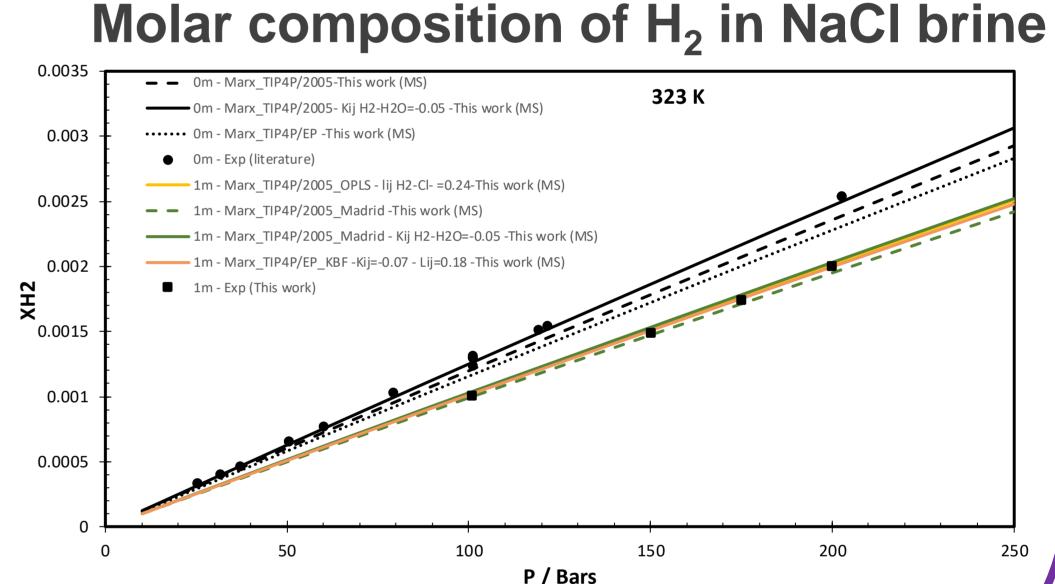


 $\checkmark$  According to the RDF results,  $H_2$ - $H_2$ O and  $H_2$ -Cl<sup>-</sup> interactions are dominant!

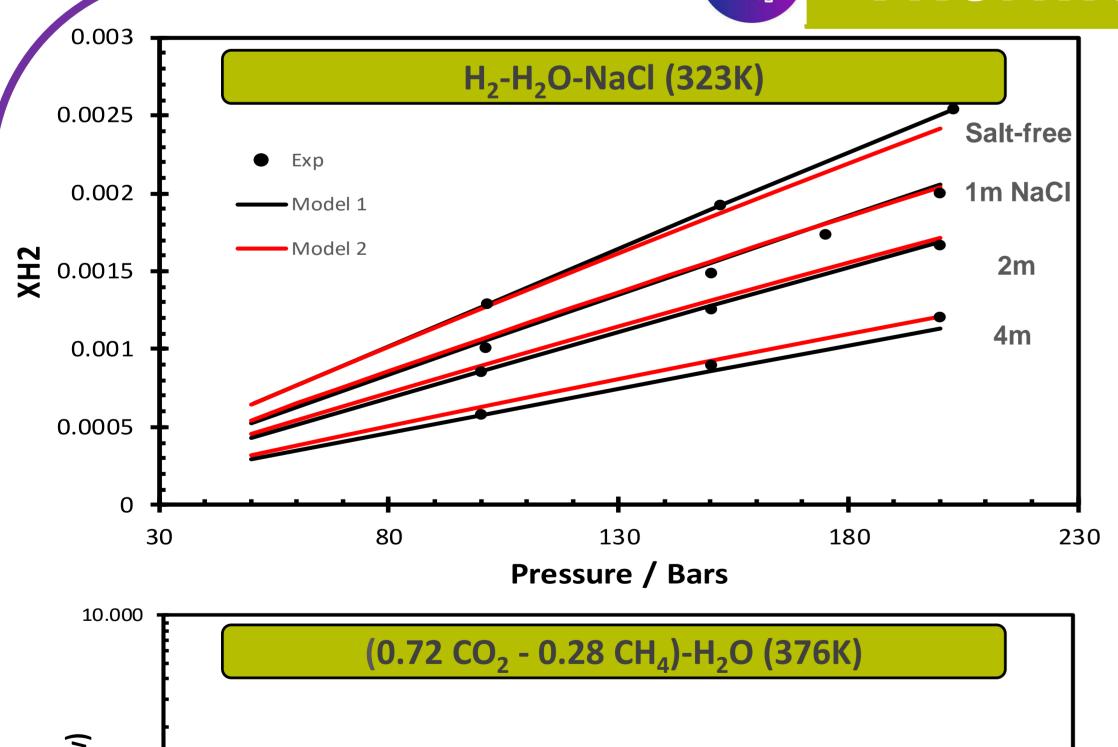
✓ The radial distribution function (RDF) is used to evaluate the solvation structure of the H2/brine \( \xi \) mixtures which is shown to be dominated by the H<sub>2</sub>-H<sub>2</sub>O and H<sub>2</sub>-Cl<sup>-</sup> interactions. A constant BIP on energy for H<sub>2</sub>-H<sub>2</sub>O and on volume for H<sub>2</sub>-Cl<sup>-</sup> are used to improve the quantification of the H<sub>2</sub>

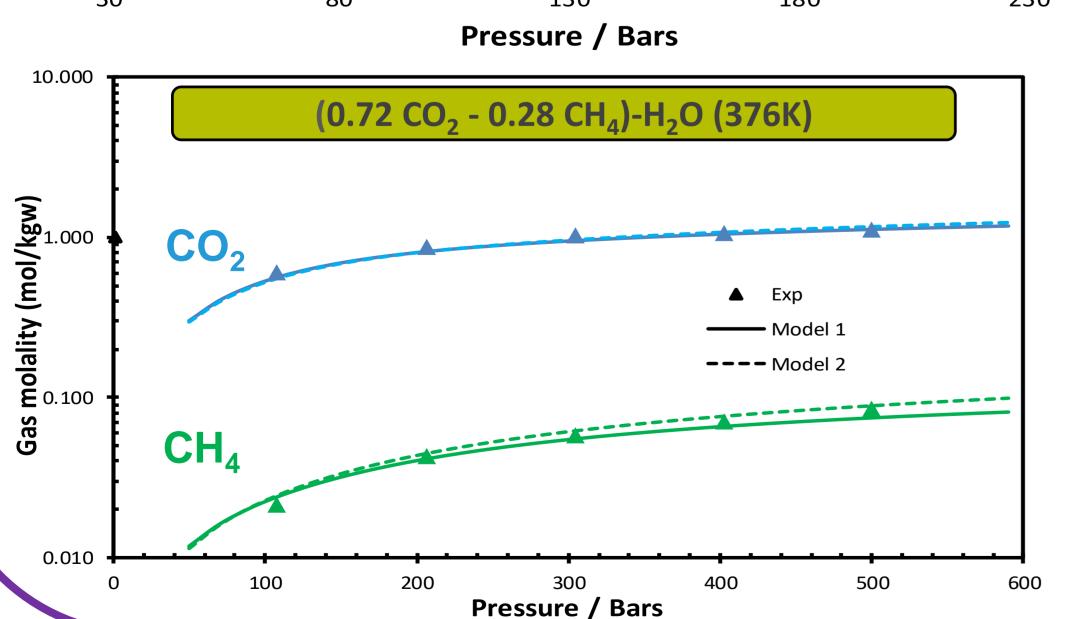


Pseudo-data from molecular simulations can be produced under storage conditions in aquifers with temperatures ranging from 298.15 K to 453.15 K and NaCl molality up to 3 mol/kg<sub>w</sub>.

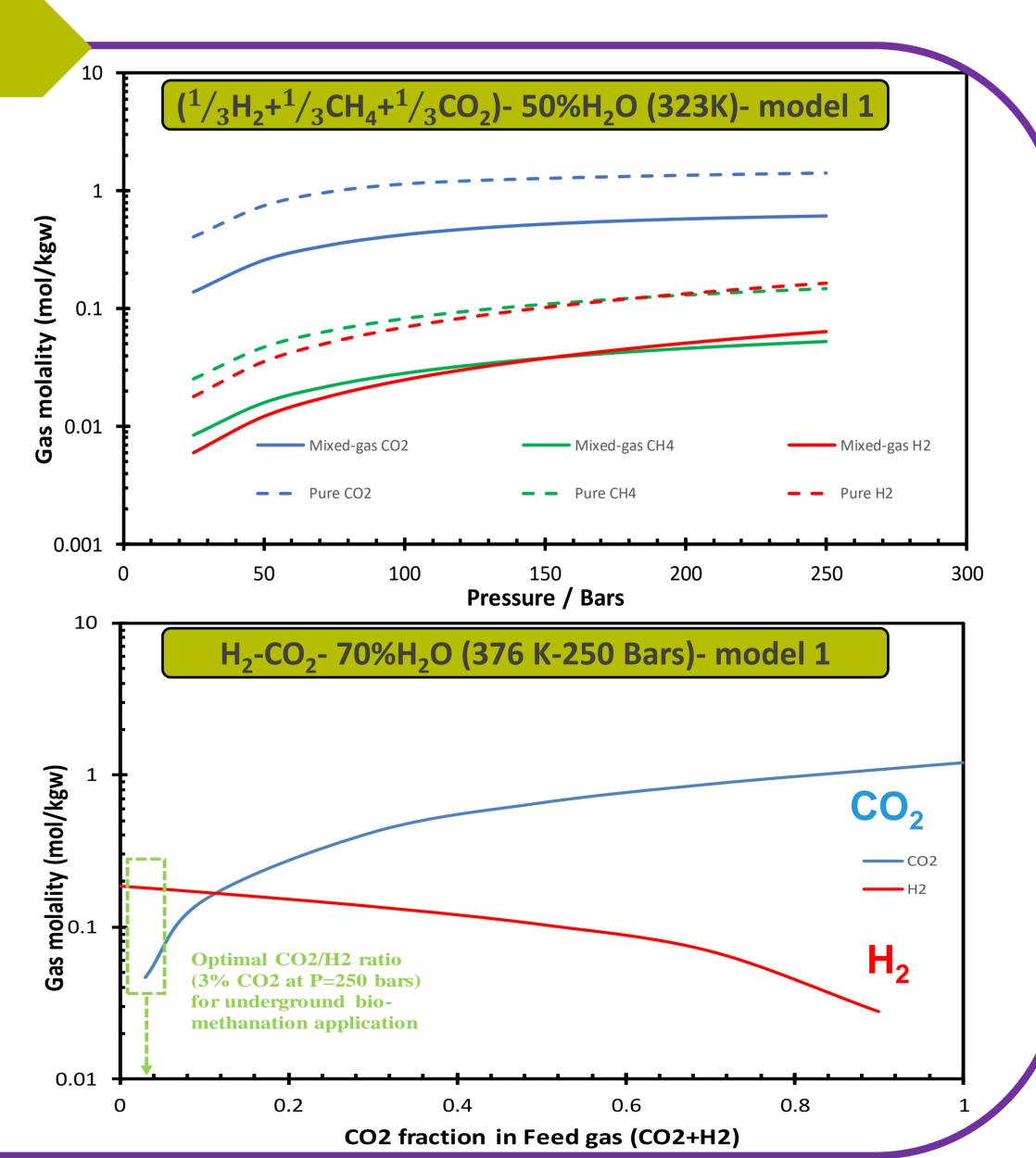

## Selected models

- Model 1: Henry+γ/EoS model;
- Model 2: Søreide and Whitson EoS.
- ✓ The parameters of both models are fitted on binary (gas/water) solubility data.
- ✓ The models predict the ternary CO₂-CH₄-H<sub>2</sub>O system very well when compared with literature experimental data.
- ✓ The co-solubility of mixed-gas in the quaternary system H<sub>2</sub>-CH<sub>4</sub>-CO<sub>2</sub>-H<sub>2</sub>O is also predicted and compared with the single-gas (binary systems) solubilities.
- ✓ The ternary H<sub>2</sub>-CO<sub>2</sub>-H<sub>2</sub>O system was also modeled to estimate the optimal H<sub>2</sub>/CO<sub>2</sub> ratio for underground bio-methanation application.



# Conclusions & Perspectives

- Molecular simulation models were validated and used to provide "pseudo-experimental" data. These data in addition to those from the literature for other gases (CH<sub>4</sub> and CO<sub>2</sub>) were used to optimize the parameters of the thermodynamic models (phi-phi and gamma-phi approaches).
- Finally, the thermodynamic modeling showed that the optimal H<sub>2</sub>/CO<sub>2</sub> ratio for underground bio-methanation application is around 3% CO<sub>2</sub> (97% H<sub>2</sub>) to be injected (to have a stochiometric ratio of 1:4).
